Defiant Malta digs in over EU port state control

ALTA intends to vote against the proposed European Union port state control directive, which attempts to link a new ship inspection regime with flag state performance.

The Mediterranean island, home to one of Europe's largest fleets, says the directive would be "counterproductive" in that it would discourage certain registers from improving quality by banning ships from European waters for an "indefinite" period.

Conclusions from this week's EU council of transport ministers show the Maltese delegation told other EU ministers "it would vote against" the proposal – a relatively rare event in today's Europe of compromise.

Concessions

Malta could technically be outvoted, according to the EU's qualified majority rules, although Brussels legislators are likely to offer the country further concessions in order to achieve widespread agreement for the new inspection regime.

Ministers, who were examining the directive for the first time, nevertheless pushed the directive forward through the EU machine by coming to a "general approach," meaning that the vast majority were in favour.

The directive is designed to introduce a new port state inspection regime which targets all ships rather than a certain percentage. Substandard vessels are due to be targetted more often than quality vessels, with repeat offenders banned completely from EU waters unless they make drastic changes, including a possible change of flag.

"Ships that on various occasions have proven not to comply with international standards on safety, health and the environment will be refused access to member state ports," the conclusions read.

"As criteria for such a measure the performance of the ship is evaluated in relation to the performance of its flag state, determined on the basis of the black, grey and white lists of flag states established by the Paris Memorandum of Understanding."

Obligation

Ships banned indefinitely could however trade again in the EU after 36 months if they fulfil conditions, including the obligation to fly the flag of a state on the white list, ministers concluded. Vessels must also be managed by a company "with a high performance."

The Paris MOU covers the waters of European coastal states plus the Atlantic basin. The aim of its 25 participating administrations is to eliminate substandard shipping via harmonised port state control.

It assesses flag state performance according to black, grey and white lists, compiled over a rolling three-year period. Malta moved up from the grey list to the white list in July this year.

"We are not opposed to the directive by any means but there is room for more discussion. Perhaps it can be improved," said Lino Vassallo, executive director of the Malta merchant marine. Banning ships on the grey list would be counterproductive, he said.

"If they [flag states] are working very hard to improve performance and they face the possibility of a ban there will be a lack of inducement."

Malta is also opposed to making inspections of vessels at anchor compulsory, Mr Vassallo said, on both cost and safety grounds.

The shipowning industry is pushing for the new inspection regime to be based on the record of individual ships, not their operating companies or the flags they fly.

This position has received some support in the European parliament.

London, Dec 7 — Incoming Roll On Roll Off Aburdees ran aground in the Oostgat between Buoy OG 19 and DL12, after having engine troubles yesterday afternoon. At about 1700 hrs the first tug Schouwenbank connected a towing line. Also tugs of Multraship and the U.R.S. came to the stranding place, tugs Multrasalvoe, Multraship Responder, Multraship 12 and Walcheren. The tugs could not refloat the vessel. At the next incoming tide the vessel was been refloated at about 0130, local time, this morning. It has been towed to Flushing Roads and anchored there for inspection by the authorities.

The barge is drifting eastwards and was located

in lat 54 45N, long 00 08E, a short time ago. It is expected to ground on the beach in the next couple of hours if weather/wind conditions remain the

London, Dec 7 — Following received from the Maritime & Coastguard Agency, dated today: The Coastguard tug Anglian Monarch is currently on its way to recover a drifting barge which is one hundred and five metres in length and forty metres wide and is a short way off Hope Point off Seaford, east of Newhaven, in very poor weather. The barge was set adrift after its towing vessel, tug *Ajaks*, had earlier encountered mechanical problems. The nine crew of the Aiaks have now been able to fix their problem and are under way to Southampton. The tug was towing the empty oil barge from Dungeness to St Nazaire. Weather in the area: Wind south-westerly, force 7 (near gale), moderate visibility with a heavy swell. The Anglian Monarch is due to arrive on scene about 1530 today and will attempt to recover the drifting barge and take it under tow if possible. Mike Greiner, Watch Manager at Solent Coastguard said: "The weather at the moment is creating conditions at sea which makes it unfavourable for anyone on a vessel. Although the barge's anchors have been deployed, the vessel is under terrific pressure in the rough seas. From our Coastguard teams on shore we are monitoring the progress of the barge and it seems to have come to rest about 100 metres offshore. We will have to wait until the weather abates before deciding on the next course of action.'

fishing (general) Atlantic Pursuit (1286 gt, built 1976) damaged in heavy weather off Newfoundland was working this evening to make repairs. Rescue officials received a distress call just before noon today from the Atlantic Pursuit after a large wave took out the vessel's electronics and wheelhouse windows. The 33 people on board were not injured in the incident about 260 nautical miles southeast of St. John's, said the rescue coordination centre in Halifax. A Canadian Forces Hercules aircraft and a coast guard vessel were sent to the area. By this evening, the rescue centre said the weather in the area had subsided, two other ships were alongside the damaged vessel, and the crew of Atlantic Pursuit remained on board while making repairs. Atlantic Pursuit is a Grand Bank Seafoods factory-freezer clam vessel owned and operated by Clearwater Seafoods Limited Partnership. Clearwater said in a news release Atlantic Pursuit will be towed to port once an assessment of the vessel's condition is made by those on the scene. The company also said other commercial vessels in the area were standing by to offer help if needed.

London, Dec 6 — Following received from Halifax RCC, timed 0830, UTC: Fishing Atlantic Vigour and another vessel are alongside fishing (general) Atlantic Pursuit which is in lat 44 26N, long 48 33W. A Coast Guard patrol vessel is en route and fish factory Arctic Endeavour is also en route and due on scene at approximately 2337, UTC, today. The intention is to await daylight then assess the situation and attempt to get a tow line on board Atlantic Pursuit.

London, Dec 7 — Following received from Halifax RCC, timed 0840, UTC: Fishing (general) Atlantic Pursuit: Fish factory Arctic Endeavour is now on scene and the intention is for Arctic Endeavor to take Atlantic Pursuit in tow at daylight.

London, Nov 30 — A press report, dated Nov 28, states: Five people have been injured as a result of the collision between ferry Avemar Dos (5517 gt, built 1997) and passenger ro/ro Atlas (6767 gt, built 1974) in the Straits of Gibraltar today. The collision took place when coming out of Algeciras port when Atlas struck the port side stern of Avemar Dos. The collision caused important material damage to the stern of Avemat Dos in spite of which, the vessel, which operates between Algeciras and Ceuta, could continue its voyage to Ceuta port. The

Marine Captainship of Algeciras has opened an investigation to clarify the causes of the collision. On arrival at Ceuta five people have had to be transferred to the civil hospital of the National Institute of GestiÛn Sanitaria. None of the injuries to the four men and one woman are serious. According to shipping company Buquebes Espana SA Avemar Dos will remain out of operation for several days for repairs and while repairs are being carried out they will operate with passenger ro/ro Patricia Olivia, although they will remain without covering the five daily rotations that Avemar Dos made. (Note — According to Lloyd's MIU AIS was at Algeciras at 1937, UTC, today and Atlas was in lat 36 08 13N, long 05 24 21W, at 1937, UTC, today, speed 14.7 knots, course 336 degress.)

BORDER HEATHER (Isle of Man)

London, Dec 3 — Following press release received today from the Maritime and Coastguard Agency: Aberdeen Coastguard are currently coordinating assistance to product tanker Border Heather (2200 gt, built 2004), a 75 metre long coastal tanker which is currently drifting about six miles off the coast after its main engines cut out in heavy seas outside the Pentland Firth, off Noss Head, near Wick. The vessel, which is in ballast, is currently drifting at about two knots and has ten crew on board. Engineers are currently working on the problem. They informed the Coastguard that their intention, after getting the engines running, is to head back to Scrabster and Thurso Bay to seek shelter. The MCA's Emergency Towing Vessel Anglian Prince was immediately required to steam to her position from its current position in Shetland and stand by the vessel to lend assistance if necessary. Their estimated time of arrival is about 1300 hrs, today. In the meantime the RNLI's all weather lifeboat from Wick was also launched and asked to stand by the vessel. A rescue helicopter is also standing by should any evacuation from the vessel prove necessary. Steve Quinn, Aberdeen Coastguard Watch Manager said "The weather on scene is pretty awful at the moment with force 7 south-easterlies and very heavy seas. We are constantly monitoring their progress using our Automatic Identification System (screen grab available) and we are in regular dialogue with the master of the vessel as to his progress."

London, Dec 3 — Following received from Coastguard Aberdeen MRCC, timed 1815, UTC: Product tanker Border Heather was taken in tow by tug Anglian Prince about 1500, UTC, and is being taken to Sinclair Bay, north of Wick, for shelter, ETA 1900, UTC. Vessel is expected to effect some repairs there. Wind on scene is force 8-9 (gale-strong gale).

London, Dec 4 — Following received from Coastguard Aberdeen MRCC, timed 0605, UTC: Product tanker Border Heather is currently anchored in Sinclair Bay. Fair Isle inshore lifeboat is attending.

CALA PALMA (Italy)

London, Dec 4 — Information received from Kiel, dated today, states: Workers of the Lloyd Yard in Bremerhaven started with the removel of burnt debris on board refrigerated general cargo Cala Palma on Dec 1. The amount of damage can only be assessed after having a look behind the burnt isolation so there is no decision of the ship's insurance about the further proceedings yet.

CEDARGLEN (Canada)

London, Dec 4 — Bulker Cedarglen (18531 gt, built 1959) reported losing propulsion in lat 49 13 59N, long 68 07 59W, at 0020, EST, Dec 3. The vessel was towed to Baie Comeau anchorage for repairs.

Montreal, Dec 4 — Bulker Cedarglen experienced a main engine camshaft failure. Understand a spare length of camshaft will be taken from a sister vessel. Repairs are expected to be completed Dec 6. — Lloyd's Agents.

CELTIC STAR (Cyprus)

London, Dec 5 — Information received, dated Dec 2, states: Adverse conditions on the Irish Sea which prevailed on Thursday (Nov 30)

appear to have caused problems for Roll On Roll Off Celtic Star (11086 gt, built 1992) operating the Dublin Liverpool ro/ro service. It was noted yesterday at Brocklebank Dock, Liverpool, looking somewhat the worse for wear. Three drop trailers appeared to have broken loose, two of which had overturned and a third was sandwiched between. One trailer had broken through the port side rails and could be seen to be in a somewhat precarious position overhanging the side of the ship. This trailer had also apparently damaged other deck fittings. By late yesterday afternoon a crane was at work on the dock side lifting skips on board the vessel which were being filled with the contents of the overturned trailers which were understood to be pizzas. (Note -According to Lloyd's MIU AIS Celtic Star was in Dublin port at 0929, UTC, today.)

CORUNA DOS (Spain)

London, Dec 4 — A press report, dated today, states: Fishing (general) Coruna Dos, with a crew of 11, which was damaged at the height of yesterday's storm has arrived safely in Castletownbere, Co Cork. The 100-foot long vessel was 60 nautical miles west of the Skelligs rocks when four of its wheelhouse windows were smashed and its communications equipment knocked out when it was hit by a 40-foot wave. The vessel was accompanied into Castletownbere by another Spanish fishing vessel.

COURTNEY L. (Bermuda)

London, Dec 5 — A press report, dated Dec 3, states: Dozens of bags of Doritos that washed up on Hatteras Island last week came from one of four cargo containers that was swept off Refrigerated Container Carrier Courtney L. (19595 gt, built 1992) during a storm, the Coast Guard says. The container, about 45 feet long, was spotted floating near Diamond Shoals on Wednesday (Nov 29). Apparently charter boat masters spotted the container and opened it. The container appeared to have been filled with about 400 3-foot by 4-foot boxes of Doritos, each holding about 20 individual bags, according to John McCutcheon, Cape Hatteras National Seashore district ranger for Hatteras Island. The National Park Service spent most of Thursday securing the site and using two bulldozers to remove the container, McCutcheon said. Meanwhile, dozens of people roamed the beach with garbage bags to pick up the chips from the tide line. The Coast Guard said Friday that the container was one of four that washed off Courtney L. during a storm the night of Nov 22-23 as it sailed somewhere near the Virginia-North Carolina line. The other three have yet to be located. One was filled with another, unknown Frito-Lay product, and the other two held paper products, said Coast Guard Petty Officer Kevin Schneider of the Marine Safety Team in Elizabeth City. The ship is owned by Great White Fleet Ltd, of Cincinnati, a

subsidiary of Chiquita Brands International, and was carrying its cargo from Wilmington, Del, to Costa Rica, Chiquita spokesman Mike Mitchell said. Great White is responsible for cleanup and removal costs, McCutcheon said. But no lasting impact was noted.

DMS HAWK

Portsmouth, UK, Dec 3 — Tug *DMS HAWK* (184 gt) was due to leave Hardinxveld, Netherlands, for sea duty this morning, but this has been postponed due to a tyre entangled in a propeller. — Correspondent.

ELLIDA ACE (Panama)

Yokohama, Dec 1 — After taking the cargo remaining on board, bulker Ellida Ace left the shoal on Nov 18, when "landing of the cargo" was commenced at a nearby berth, together with temporary repairs to the vessel. Having completed the cargo discharge and repair, the vessel departed from the port of Kashima for a repair dock on Nov 30. — Lloyd's Agents.

London, Dec 6 — Bulker Ellida Ace arrived Qingdao Dec 5.

ENCOUNTER (Netherlands)

London, Dec 4 — General cargo *Eren C.* was exposed to a sea peril due to the engine failure and drifting in front of the Istinye in Istanbul Strait at 2147, Dec 3 . As a result of salvage assistance operation *Eren C.* has been anchored "to" Buyukdere at 2345 hrs.

FLESTINA-5 (Russia)

London, Dec 1 — General cargo Flestina-5 (1408 gt, built 1978), ran aground on river Volga, near Astrakhan, after veering off channel at 0800, local time, Nov 29. Vessel is still aground, waiting for tug.

FRANCESCO GANGITANO (Italy)

The Coast Guard received a report from the master of tug Merrimack (132 gt, built 1968) at about 0145 hrs that his diesel barge had hit the piling about half a mile from the Quantico Wharf and struck the port bow of the 46-foot Snoopy II. No one was hurt, and the diesel barge did not rupture. About two gallons of Snoopy II's fuel have leaked out, and absorbent boom has been placed around the area. All but the flying bridge of the boat is underwater. The Coast Guard is investigating the incident with the Maryland Department of the Environment and the Wicomico County Sheriff's Office.

MIDLAND 2 (St. Vincent & Grenadines)

The four men were battered but unharmed after their failed attempt to save the *Miss Melissa*, said Cmdr. Brad Lee, skipper of *San* Antonio. The Navy received a distress call from Miss Melissa about 1430 Friday. The ship reported taking on heavy water in rough seas about 50 miles east of Oregon Inlet, Lee said. San Antonio was conducting its exercises nearby, Lee said. A V-22 Osprey flew from the deck of the warship to the ailing vessel and confirmed its location. San Antonio steamed toward the watermen. Lee ordered a rescue team into a rigid-hull inflatable boat to approach the vessel. The men had been fishing for a few days and had 7,000 pounds of tuna, mackerel and swordfish on board. The watermen had spent several hours pumping water from their battered ship before the Navy arrived. They were initially reluctant to leave.

London, Dec 4 — A press report, dated today, states: Norfolk based Amphibious ship San Antonio rescued four men from sinking fishing Miss Melissa on Friday. Despite the efforts to save Miss Melissa it sank. Saturday

morning San Antonio dropped the fishermen off at Oregon Inlet, North Carolina.

London, Dec 4 — Following received from Coast Guard Portsmouth, Va, timed 1210, UTC: Fishing Miss Melissa, official No.593587, sank in lat 36 31N, long 74 13.9W.

NAUTILUS (Netherlands)

London, Dec 1 — Following received from Den Helder RCC, timed 1040, UTC: Hopper dredger *Nautilus* (3880 gt, built 1996) sank at Pointe Noire, Congo, Nov 30. Fourteen of the 17 crew were rescued and three died.

London, Dec 1 — A Royal Boskalis Westminster NV press release, dated today, states: Hopper dredger Nautilus capsized during dredging activities for the port of Pointe Noire at around 2130, Dutch time, last night (Nov 30). In the course of last night it became clear that three lives were lost in the accident. This concerns two employees of Boskalis and one local employee of the port of Pointe Noire. Rescue services were quickly on the spot and the other 14 crewmembers were taken to safety. The cause of the accident is not yet known and is being investigated.

London, Dec 1 — Three people died when hopper dredger Nautilus capsized while working on routine maintenance work in the Republic of Congo. Royal Boskalis Westminster spokesman, Roel Berends, confirmed that no other vessel was involved and that the weather had not been stormy. Two Boskalis employees, a Dutchman and Filipino, had been killed and a local employee from the port of Pointe Noire. Their families had been notified, said Mr Berends. Rescue services were quickly on the spot and the other 14 crew members were taken to safety. Mr Berends said the vessel was carrying out maintenance work to the access channel to the port. Currently, the cause of the accident is not yet known and the incident is being investigated. A Boskalis team have flown out to the port and the local authorities are helping with the investigations, he added.

Kristiansand, Dec 1 — Crude oil tanker Navion Hispania: Teekay Superintendent informs that vessel repairs in Stavanger were completed Nov 29. Vessel sailed to the Varg field in the North Sea. — Lloyd's Agents.

The tug and barge were backing out to Saginaw Bay when southwesterly winds blowing at some 20-miles an hour created low water levels. The tug and barge had delivered stone to the Sargent Dock in Essexville and Saginaw Rock Products in Zilwaukee. After having bow thruster problems and another ship had trouble turning around at the 6th Street turning basin, the tug's master decided to back down the river to the turning basin, south of Bay City. Low water levels and swift currents prevented the combo from turning around by the James Clements Airport. As the comb passed through the railroad bridge in Essexville, the barge and tug ran aground. The Saginaw-based tug Gregory Busch helped free the stuck vessel about 0700 hrs. — Great Lakes and Seaway Shipping News.

ROKIA DELMAS (Panama)

London, Dec 1 - Roll On Roll Off Container Car Rokia Delmas which ran aground off the island of RÈ close to the French Atlantic coast port of La Rochelle on Oct 24, has been declared a total loss by its insurers. Confirming the information, CMA CGM said, however, that it had not yet been decided what to do with the vessel, which is still on the site where it ran aground 2.5 km off the island's beaches. "The salvors are in the process of studying the different options available," a spokeswoman said. She said that everything was being done to get the vessel refloated at the earliest opportunity but that the time it would take would depend on weather conditions. The maritime

prefecture in Brest, which is overseeing the salvage operation, indicated some time ago that it did not want to break up the vessel where it is. A spokesman confirmed yesterday that this was still the position, explaining that the prefecture was concerned that any operation undertaken should not have a negative effect in an area which was particularly environmentally sensitive. Apart from being in a prime tourist area, the site of the grounding is also close to oyster farms and sea salt production centres. Principal salvor Les Abeilles International, which is working with SMIT Salvage of the Netherlands, has already emptied the vessel of its fuel and is currently in the process of removing the containers it was carrying. A maritime prefecture spokesman said yesterday that, despite interruption of work by bad weather during the last two weeks and the vessel's heavy list, 187 containers had already been removed, leaving its upper deck virtually clear. He said that the remaining 190 containers would be removed as soon as whether conditions permitted but that the task promised to be much less difficult than that of removing the containers from the upper deck. The parties involved in the salvage operation were meeting yesterday at the maritime prefecture to discuss how the vessel could best be removed once cargo unloading had been completed, although no definitive decision was expected to be taken. "It is a first stage," said the spokesman, adding that the ideal solution was likely to involve lightening the vessel as much as possible prior to refloating it and then taking it away to a suitable site for demolition.

Nantes, Dec 6 — Roll On Roll Off Container Car Rokia Delmas has been declared a total loss. The discharge of cargo is currently interrupted by prevailing weather conditions. The ultimate objective remains the integral removal of the ship, with obligation of result. — Lloyd's Agents.

Troy, Michigan, Dec 5 — U.S. Coast Guard personnel, today, were helping tug Susan Hoey to recover tug Seneca, lost in high seas on Lake Superior Dec 2. Susan Hoey sought refuge in Grand Marais Harbor Saturday night, after a storm with high seas forced the Minnesota-bound vessel into port. Susan Hoey was towing Seneca, which was lost in the storm and was drifting toward Crisp Point yesterday. "We located it at 0830 hrs this morning and we are on our way to go get it, master of Susan Hoey said. On Saturday, Susan Hoey ran into a sudden storm that blew up on Lake Superior. The storm produced snow squalls and seas as high as 16 feet, causing ice to build up on the tug. U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary Member Howard Baker of Grand Marais guided the Susan Hoey through Grand Marais' harbor, at midnight, due to the poor visibility from the ice-encased shroud of the pilot house. Seneca was adrift in the storm. First-mate Ted Wagner said almost an inch of ice built up on both tugs before the Seneca broke away. As Susan Hoey crested a wave, Seneca would plunge, almost completely submerging its tow line. Then the bow of Susan Hoey would dip below the waves as Seneca would bob up. The seas frightened the crew members, Wagner said. "I was afraid the windows were going to break. I thought we were going to capsize," he said. — Great Lakes & Seaway Shipping.

London, Dec 5 — A Coast Guard Grand Marais, Michigan, press release, dated Dec 4, states: Multiple

Coast Guard and state assests responded to the grounding of tug Seneca located approximately 18 nautical miles east of Grand Marais. There was no apparent damage to the tug and no apparent danger of pollution. Coast Guard Cutters Katmai Bay and Alder, Station Sault Ste. Marie, Mich. and Coast Guard Air Station Traverse City, Mich., searched for the adrift tug. The tug was being towed from Sault Ste. Marie, Mich. to Grand Marais by tug Susan Hoey when the lines between them parted sending the unmanned Seneca adrift on the lake. The search was conducted under limited weather conditions throughout the weekend. Seneca was discovered by the Alder, who was diverted from working aids to navigation missions. There was no apparent pollution or damage to the vessel. Ingram Barge was contacting its customers yesterday to determine whether any critical shipments should be loaded on trucks for immediate shipment. So far, all of the company's clients are willing to wait a week until the main lock is reopened, said Kaj Shah, Ingram Barge's customer service vice president. "Unless there's really critical cargo, by the time alternative arrangements can be made, and the expense you would lose, you're better off waiting," Shah said. Tuesday's barge accident, which remains under investigation, shut down an auxiliary lock that had been used since Aug 4, when an earlier barge accident shut down the main lock. Repairs to the main lock are scheduled to be completed Dec 6. Repairs to the auxiliary lock have not been scheduled. About 75 vessels are waiting at or near the lock, said Chief of Operations Mike Ensch of the Army Corps of Engineers. A few more may arrive before the lock reopens next week, he added. Areas most affected include Chattanooga and Decatur, Guntersville, and Huntsville, Ala.

The Japan Coast Guard could pass on its findings to prosecutors by the end of March for possible indictment on charges of professional negligence posing danger to traffic, the source said. The Japanese military submarine collided with a civilian vessel during exercises off southern Japan on Nov 21. The Maritime Self-Defense Forces submarine Asashio clipped the chemical tanker during a surfacing operation about 30 miles off the southeastern coast of Miyazaki. None of the 17 crew was hurt, but the ship's master reported that the vessel was taking on water. The Japanese Coast Guard subsequently sent three patrol boats to escort Spring Auster into Shibushi Bay, Kagoshima prefecture, for inspection. There were no injuries reported on board Asashio, only a dent to the aft fin. Last week Eiji Yoshikawa, chief of the Maritime Staff Office would only say that the accident was caused by human error and detailed investigations would be held to see how operations were coordinated among the crew. (Note -According to Lloyd's MIU AIS Spring Auster was last reported in lat 30 31 32N, long 122 01 55E, at 0403, UTC, Nov 26, speed 10.6 knots, course 82 degrees.)

Clean-up of the spilled oil is in progress. Shosei Maru was towed to Tonocho, Kagawa, where the cargo of oil was transhipped onto another vessel. — Lloyd's Agents.

YIN CHU

London, Dec 4 — A press report, dated today, states: Dredger Yin Chu, former roll-on-roll-off Yin Chu, 15,000 tons, sank on Saturday (Dec 2) while trying to berth in the Huangpu River near Nanpu Bridge in Shanghai. Attempts will be made to salve the Yin Chu this week but it will be a complicated operation, according to maritime officials. "No one was injured in the accident and no oil polluted the river," said Zhou Zhengbao of the Shanghai Maritime Safety Administration. "The work didn't begin right after the accident because we need some time to work out a salvage plan for such a big ship." All holes in the ship were blocked soon after the accident to prevent pollution, Zhou said. Two tugs berthed beside the 150-metre former roll-on-roll-off Yin Chu to prevent it from floating to the middle of the river. It had been turned into a dredge ship by Ruike Shipping Company and was being tested in the river when the accident occurred about 1230 hrs. The company believes the sinking was probably caused by an unclosed door. Water apparently entered from the door and the ship sank in two hours. But company officials said the exact reason will not be pinpointed until salvage work is completed.

London, Dec 5 - Salvors from the Maritime Shanghai Safety Administration were, yesterday, working to refloat dredger Yin Chu, which partially sank on the Huangpu River, in Shanghai on Dec 2. No one was hurt in the incident, according to the local maritime bureau, which is investigating the accident. The vessel was carrying out dredging near the Nanpu bridge when the accident occurred, at about 1300 local time. There was a slight oil spill, but antipollution measures were put into place to prevent further contamination. Pictures show the vessel slightly listing to port and the main deck underwater. although superstructure was clear of the water.

London, Dec 5 — A press report, dated today, states: A funds dispute is holding up salvage operations on dredger Yin Chu that sank in the Huangpu River on Saturday (Dec 2). Maritime officials said they were trying to get work started through mediation. Zhou Zhengbao, an official with the Shanghai Maritime Safety Administration, said salvors would probably start raising Yin Chu in the next two or three days if negotiations went smoothly. It is expected to cost several million yuan to raise the ship. A maritime authority source said the key was getting the ship owner and

the company working on the vessel at time of the accident to reach a quick agreement over the huge salvage bill. "Since the vessel has such a great tonnage, the salvage work must follow a sophisticated plan," said Zhou. Yin Chu sank in about two hours after it was flooded when berthing about 70 to 80 metres off a dock near the Nanpu Bridge on Saturday, according to the marine authority. It said yesterday investigations so far showed that the accident was probably caused by an unclosed door on board the vessel. The ship was undergoing a refitting program when berthing near the dock. No one was injured and the maritime authority said cabin oil that leaked during the sinking was quickly contained, saving the river from pollution. Two tugs have been anchored beside the shipwreck since Saturday, as part of its mast and driver's room are still above the water. The tugs will work to stabilize the sunken vessel to prevent it from floating free and blocking the waterway. Five patrol boats are also cruising near the scene to maintain smooth shipping traffic.

IJE-ODODO, LAGOS, NIGERIA

London, Dec 4 — A press report, dated yesterday, states: A ruptured fuel pipeline exploded outside

Nigeria's commercial capital, killing at least one person, state-owned radio in the West African country said today. The pipeline burst into flames yesterday after leaking gasoline for days from a rupture apparently caused by thieves trying to steal fuel in Ije-Ododo, a village on the outskirts of Lagos, Radio Nigeria said. The report said at least one person died in the fire, citing residents and witnesses. The pipeline, which is operated by state-owned Nigerian National Petroleum Corp. and transports imported fuel from Lagos ports to inland depots, was still burning this evening, the report said. Fire trucks had been sent to the area but were having difficulty getting to the site. State oil company officials were not immediately available for comment.

SURABAYA AREA, INDONESIA

Jakarta, Dec 3 — A 43-year-old man died today from injuries sustained after a gas pipeline explosion in Java island last month, taking the toll from the disaster to 13, media reports said. The Nov 22 blast, which disrupted gas operations in the region covered by state oil company Pertamina's East Java Gas Pipeline, occurred in an area where hot mud has been gushing unchecked since the end of May following a drilling accident. The man suffered more than 52% burns to his body after the blast, Metro TV reported. The state Antara news agency said two more people were still missing after the accident. The pipeline was located underneath sand and gravel dikes made to contain the mud. The transmission pipe broke after land subsidence hiked the pressure, igniting some of the gas. Anger has been mounting in the area with the mud pouring out at a rate of 50,000 cubic metres a day from the well despite various attempts to plug the leak. The mudflow has inundated a major toll road, several villages, dozens of factories and swathes of paddy and sugarcane fields, causing an unfolding environmental disaster in Sidoarjo, an industrial suburb of Indonesia's second largest city Surabaya. President Susilo Bambang Yudhovono ordered last week the total closure of the 440-ha area affected by the mudflow, saying it was considered a dangerous area. — Reuters.



London, Dec 6 — A press report, dated Dec 5, states: Floods triggered by nearly two weeks of heavy rain have washed away roads and bridges, wiped out crops and killed at least three people in western Haiti, the International Red Cross said today. The destruction has been most severe in the rural departments of Grande

Anse and Nippes, along the impoverished Caribbean nation's vulnerable south-western peninsula. Flooding has also affected the northwestern town of Port-de-Paix. Haitian Red Cross workers have been providing first aid to injured residents and moving flood-stricken villagers to temporary shelters, the International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies said. The Genevabased group said it has asked donors for \$522,800 to buy hygiene kits, water, blankets and mosquito nets for 17,500 people affected by flooding. The rain began Nov 22, unleashing flash floods that killed livestock, damaged two hospitals and isolated many remote villages in the heavily deforested country.

OMAN

London, Dec 4 — The port of Mina al Fahal was declared closed for berthing/unberthing operations at 0600, local time, this morning due to high swell and wind. The port had been closed for the same reason from 2130, local time, Dec 2 until it was reopened at 1425, yesterday.

PAKISTAN

London, Dec 5 — A press report, dated today, states: Heavy rains and strong winds pounded Karachi port for three days, toppling billboards, triggering power outages and leaving six people dead in separate rainrelated incidents, police said today. The deaths occurred in various areas of Karachi yesterday and most were caused by electricity cables snapped by the storm, Karachi police chief Tariq Jamil said. Heavy rains also have lashed other areas of Pakistan in recent days. In the rugged mountainous northwest, snow also

REPUBLIC OF IRELAND

London, Dec 4 — A press report, dated today, states: A major clean-up is getting underway this morning following damage caused by severe weather conditions over the weekend (Dec 2-3). Flooding hit several towns and villages across the country yesterday following torrential downpours, with Crossmolina, Co Mayo, among the worst-affected areas. High winds toppled trees and knocked down power lines, leaving 15,000 homes around the country without electricity. The weather is expected to ease today, but could worsen again towards the end of the week, with Met Eireann predicting further flooding in some places.

London, Dec 4 — A press report, dated today, states: Flood waters have started to recede across the Republic of Ireland, as the severe weather conditions that affected the country over the weekend (Dec 2-3) have eased. Crossmolina in Co Mayo was one of the towns worst affected by

TYPHOON "DURIAN"

Manila, Nov 30 — The Philippine Coast Guard has shut down all ports in the southern part of Luzon as well as ports in the islands of Samar and Mindoro today following the entry into Philippine territory of typhoon "Durian." The closure of all ports in the path of the typhoon has stranded at least 3,920 passengers in various terminals. The National Disaster Coordinating Council (NDCC) reported that a total of 1,476 people were stranded in Calapan port in Oriental Mindoro Province, Batangas port in Batangas Province and Dalahican port in Quezon Province. The report also said that some 1,444 people were stranded in Tabaco port in Albay Province, Virac port in Catanduanes Province, Pasacao port in Camarines Sur Province and the ports of Pilar, Bulan and Matnog in Sorsogon Province. At least 571 passengers were also stranded in the port of Allen in Northern Samar Province. Lloyd's List Correspondent.

London, Dec 1 — A press report, dated today, states: At least 146 people have been killed in the Philippines by a mudslide triggered by a typhoon, the Red Cross says. Rains caused by Typhoon "Durian" brought mud and rocks down hillsides, burying two villages in the foothills of the Mayon volcano, south-east of Manila. Five other villages were also affected, and as the search for the survivors continues, the death toll may rise. The mudslides hit Albay province, with main casualties occurring in the villages of Daraga, Busay and Santo Domingo. The area affected is near the city of Legaspi, 350km from the capital, Manila.

Manila, Dec 1 — Typhoon "Durian" may have killed up to 400 people in the central Philippines after heavy rains and winds sent tonnes of mud and boulders the size of cars crashing onto villages, the head of the local Red Cross said today. Durian, which packed winds of up to 225 kph, moved into the South China Sea after lashing the Philippines since early vesterday and was expected to weaken into a tropical storm before hitting Vietnam on Monday (Dec 4). Communities close to Mount Mayon, an active volcano about 320 km south of Manila, were buried after "Durian" dislodged mounds of debris from its slopes. "There are a lot of conflicting reports but, looking at the trend, we could have about 300 to 400 people dead by tonight," Richard Gordon, a senator and head of the Philippine Red Cross, told local television. Around 11,000 people were left homeless and infrastructure damaged, including power lines and phone links knocked out, bridges washed away and roads buried by landslides. "It's a wasteland," said Noel Rosal, a mayor in the central region of Bicol. Disaster reports from other provinces were sketchy. Disaster agencies called for fresh water, medicine and body bags. Thousands of evacuees crammed into schools and churches, while some residents were marooned on roofs. "Durian," one notch below a category 5 "super typhoon", caused havoc across the central and northern Philippines, affecting nearly 22,000 people, grounding aircraft and halting sea travel. Agriculture Secretary Arthur Yap said farmers had sustained around 500 million pesos (US\$10 million) in losses after "Durian" swept through growing regions for coconuts, rice and hemp. Crop damage from previous typhoons cut third-quarter economic growth. On the island of Marinduque, trees were uprooted. lamp posts wrenched out and roofs swept from most homes. "It's the worst in our history. Almost all houses were damaged by the typhoon in the province," Congressman Edmund Reyes said on local radio. Australia's Lafayette Mining Ltd halted operations at its copper and zinc mine in the central Philippines after the typhoon damaged staff housing and power lines but the company said it hoped to reopen in two weeks. "Durian" skirted Manila, where offices and schools were closed for a national holiday. — Reuters.

Daraga, Dec 2 — Distraught survivors searched piles of bodies for the faces of their loved ones in the central Philippines today, after landslides, triggered by typhoon "Durian" left hundreds dead. Driving rain and winds of up to 225 kph (140 mph) dislodged tonnes of mud and boulders from the slopes of Mount Mayon, about 320 km (200 miles)

south of Manila, on Thursday, smothering nearby villages in a threehour torrent. The office of civil defence said 208 people had been killed and 261 were missing in the rural Bicol region. Officials said the toll was rising by the minute as rescue workers, some using their bare hands, pulled corpses and body parts from the mud. "It's already in the hundreds just covering four areas," Cedric Daep, head of the provincial disaster coordinating council told Reuters. "Right now we are on retrieval operations. We do not believe there are any survivors." Nearly 30,000 people were left homeless and whole communities were isolated as power lines and telephone links were knocked out, bridges washed away and roads blocked by uprooted coconut trees, twisted metal roofs and tonnes of mud. — Reuters.

London, Dec 3 — A press report, dated today, states: Filipino rescuers shovelled away boulders and mud yesterday, to recover bodies from mudslides that smothered mountainside villages, as officials feared the death toll from typhoon "Durian" could double to 600. Seas of thick black mud made the going tough for rescue workers, who were not believed to have pulled any survivors from the debris since the first hours after the typhoon blasted ashore. The death toll surpassed 300. Another 300 are missing and the prospects of finding any of them alive are dwindling fast. The first funerals took place last night, as bodies rapidly decomposed in the tropical heat. The Disaster Coordinating Council of the worst-hit Albay province reported 236 dead, including 129 in the town of Guinobatan in the Mayon volcano's foothills, which was swamped by floods. Three towns on Mayon's slopes, overwhelmed by mudslides of volcanic ash and boulders, each reported at least 22 dead. Four other provinces reported fatalities, but accurate figures were hard to come by because of damaged power and phone lines. In some places, rescue workers found only body parts. "We need food, tents, water, body bags," said Philippine National Red Cross official Andrew Nocon. Houses along the Yawa River in Padang, seven miles from Legazpi, the capital of Albay province, were buried under five feet of mud, with only roofs protruding. In Padang village, 28 bodies were recovered and photographed for identification by relatives, said Luis Bello, the mayor's aide. Some had been washed out to sea, then swept by currents to the shores of an adjacent town. Silangan Santander, 21, attended funeral services for her brother, Larry. Only his lower torso and legs were found near the sea. Electricity pylons were toppled, and a two-lane highway was scattered with overturned trucks. Volcano "Mayon" erupted in July and has been rumbling since then. Rains from succeeding typhoons may have loosened the materials, officials said.

Daraga, Dec 4 — The Philippines fears up to 1,000 people have been

killed in landslides and flooding triggered by Typhoon "Durian," but officials said today, that many of the bodies might never be retrieved. President Gloria Macapagal Arroyo declared a state of national calamity after "Durian", which was set to hit the Vietnamese coast today, killed 425 people and left nearly 600 missing across three central regions. Villages surrounding Mount Mayon bore the brunt, when torrential rains and wind sent walls of mud and boulders as big cars crashing onto communities. Soldiers, miners and a Spanish rescue team with a sniffer dog dug through the sludge, pulling out corpses and body parts. Nearly 60 people were killed after the chapel they were sheltering in was buried in debris. Even the New People's Army, a communist rebel group locked in a decades-old insurgency against the government, ordered its cadres to help relief efforts. Over one million people were affected by the typhoon, which sparked flooding so intense that some people, vainly clinging onto coconut trees, were washed out to sea. At least 100 people were drowned in one village and an Australian and a New Zealander were among the missing. Thousands of people were crammed into schools, churches and town halls after nearly 150,000 homes were damaged, communication lines uprooted and coconut trees, rice paddies and irrigation systems destroyed. — Reuters.

London, Dec 4 — A press report, dated today, states: Authorities in Vietnam have evacuated tens of thousands of people in the country's south, as Typhoon "Durian" heads towards the coast with winds of 130 km per hour. Meteorologists say it is expected to make landfall later tonight. Vietnam barred fishing boats from leaving the harbour several days ago and warned those at sea to avoid the typhoon, which has defied earlier predictions it would weaken as it got

closer to the coast.

Ho Chi Minh City, Dec 5 — Typhoon "Durian" swept into southern Vietnam killing at least 38 people, sinking hundreds of fishing vessels and damaging houses, days after it killed hundreds in the Philippines, government officials said today. Weather forecasters said the storm, which has winds up to 120 kph and heavy rains, took an unpredictable turn and hit the low-lying provinces of Vietnam's Mekong Delta rice-basket, raising concerns of severe flooding. "Durian" will remain a typhoon for the next day, forecasters said. The Mekong Delta and Ca Mau peninsula of southern Vietnam rarely experience strong storms. After leaving Vietnam, the storm will push westward toward Thailand, the Malaysian peninsula and into the Andaman Sea, forecasters said. Deputy Prime Minister Nguyen Sinh Hung, in charge of co-ordinating storm preparations, warned provincial leaders not to underestimate the strength of the typhoon. Vietnamese media reports today quoted provincial officials as saying the typhoon killed at least 38 people, 19 were missing and 700 injured in five provinces Ba Ria Vung Tau, Ben Tre, Binh Thuan, Vinh Long and Tien Giang. Officials said 18,400 houses were damaged and 860 boats sank, Vietnam Television reported. Vietnamese authorities evacuated tens thousands of people from vulnerable south and central areas before the arrival of "Durian", which slammed into the Philippines one notch below a category 5 super-typhoon Thursday (Nov 30). Disaster officials today raised the toll to 526 dead and 740 missing in three regions of the Philippines hit by the typhoon, which affected more than one million people in the archipelago. Disaster officials said nearly 300,000 houses were destroyed while agriculture and infrastructure damage were estimated at pesos 608 million (\$12.25 million), devastating large swathe of hemp and coconut farms in the central Bicol region. Winds and torrential rains from the storm sent walls of mud and water crashing onto communities surrounding Mount Mayon, an active volcano about 320 km south of Manila. — Reuters.

London, Dec 6 - Following received from the Meteorological Office, dated today: Tropical depression "Durian, downgraded from tropical storm, near lat 08.3N, long 103.3E, at 1800, UTC, Dec 5. Movement for the past six hours 260 degrees at 11 knots. Position accurate to within 60 nautical miles. Maximum sustained winds 25

knots, gusts 35 knots.

London, Dec 6 — A press report, dated today, states: Vietnam's death toll from tropical storm "Durian" rose to 59 today as authorities began cleaning up the country's south coast where more than 120,000 houses were destroyed, officials said. The worst damage was in Ba Ria-Vung Tau province, where at least 34 people were killed and more than 450 others injured, most of them in collapsed homes. "The death toll could rise," said Pham Nhat Quang, a spokesman for the provincial military command. "Many of the victims are in very bad condition." The government sent air force planes today to search for 29 people still missing. Thousands were evacuated before the storm hit early yesterday, but some of those killed had refused to leave their homes. Before weakening to a tropical storm and hitting Vietnam, "Durian" ravaged the eastern Philippines with a five-hour deluge and 165-mph winds on Nov 30. In Albay province, entire villages disappeared under tons of mud and volcanic debris that cascaded down the slopes of the Mayon volcano. Official figures showed 526 dead, 1,000 injured and 740 missing. Senator Richard Gordon, head of the Philippines national Red Cross, said he believed more than 1,000 died in the thousands of homes buried under volcanic debris, mud and floodwaters. More than one million people in 13 provinces were affected, and about 20,000 have gone to evacuation centres.

UNITED KINGDOM

London, Dec 4 — A press report, dated Dec 3, states: Gale-force winds and driving rain have caused major disruption across the South East, with firefighters dealing with numerous reports of fallen trees. Cross-Channel ferries were delayed for four hours when the port of Dover was shut while, also in Kent, drivers were unable to use the Dartford QE2 Bridge. Winds of up to 70mph also saw the A20 near Dover closed in both directions, and caused a 20-ton lorry to blow over. In East Sussex, sea walls were breached at Seaford and Bexhill. Dover Coastguard said conditions for vessels in the English Channel were "horrendous" with boats reduced to "walking speed." Spokeswoman Sue King said the winds had reached at least a storm 10, with gusts of up to 69 knots, the equivalent of about 80mph. Passengers planning to travel with Norfolkline ferries, Speed Ferries, P&O ferries and SeaFrance have been advised to contact the operator before leaving home as services are still subject to disruption.

London, Dec 4 — A press report, dated today, states: Yacht owners are counting the cost of the weekend's (Dec 2-3) gales which could reach more than £1m at one Devon marina. Winds gusting up to 100mph caused chaos at Queen Anne's Battery in Plymouth where boats on land collapsed against each other in a domino effect. In Saltash, on the Cornish side of the River Tamar, more boats were ripped from their moorings. Lifeboatmen described seeing a number of unmanned luxury yachts drifting down the river, helpless against the wind. The winds left more than 50,000 homes in Devon and Cornwall without electricity. Two Plymouth lifeboats were launched at 0300.UTC, when the Dolcebella's anchor cable became tangled up in its propellers, leaving it without power. Another boat sank near the crossing, leaving only the top of its mast visible above the water. Plymouth RNLI Coxswain Dave Milford said the damage at Queen Anne's Battery, where 20 to 30 yachts were piled up against each other, would be in millions of pounds. More than 5,000 homes in Cornwall remain without electricity after severe gales at the weekend. Teams from Western Power spent the last few days reconnecting 25,000 homes in the county. Five hundred homes in Devon were still without power this morning after the weekend's storms.

London, Dec 5 — A press report, dated today, states: Suffolk police have warned motorists that they should expect delays on the A14 around Felixstowe today as high winds have lead to the periodic closure of the port. The port was shut intermittently this morning as the gales buffeted the region and police said it was likely to close and re-open throughout the day, depending on conditions. They advised motorists that lorries would be stacking up in the port and it was likely to cause congestion on the A14 Felixstowe approach road. The high winds are forecasted to last until tomorrow.

London, Dec 7 — A press report, dated today, states: Six people were injured when a tornado swept through a London street leaving a trail of destruction. Rooftops were ripped off and cars were badly damaged as the freak weather hit Kensal Rise in north-west London. One man suffered a serious head injury and five people with minor injuries were treated at the scene, London Ambulance Service said. A total of 11 fire crews were called to Chamberlayne Road. The road has been closed because of the debris. Witnesses said there was heavy rain and sleet, then debris flying through the air. Emergency services were called at about 1100, GMT to reports of collapsed scaffolding and damage to buildings. Four ambulances and two fast response cars were sent to the scene and the London ambulance helicopter was scrambled. London Ambulance said a man, thought to be in his 50s, was treated for a head injury and five others were treated for shock and minor injuries at the scene. London Fire Brigade said up to 50 firefighters were at the scene and had cordoned off the area.

UNITED STATES

London, Dec 4 — A press report, dated today, states: The National Weather Service says two tornadoes were part of the severe weather that roared through Pennsylvania. Meteorologists confirmed that today, one day after two women died in the storms. Both the tornado that struck the Halifax area of northern Dauphin County and the one that struck the Mountain Top area of Luzerne County were classifed as F-One. That means they had winds between 73 mph and 112 mph. The most severe tornadoes are classified on Fujita scale as F-Five. Dauphin County officials say six businesses sustained about one-point-three million dollars in damage from the Halifax tornado. Damages to 70 homes totaled about 700thousand dollars.

London, Dec 6 — A press report, dated today, states: While not as severe as in the Lake of the Ozarks. boat and dock damage in St. Charles County is estimated by the Missouri Water Patrol at more than \$15 million. About a dozen marinas lining the Mississippi River in St. Charles County were damaged in Thursday's (Nov 30) storm. None of the marinas in Alton, Godfrey or Grafton reported any problems, apparently because of the track of the storm. Lou Amighetti of the Missouri Water Patrol said more than 250 boats in St. Charles County sustained varying degrees of damage when roofs covering them collapsed under the weight of the ice and snow. Some of the boats had only external damage; others were partly submerged. The docks continue to be unstable, preventing many marina managers and boat owners from getting a true picture of the damage. Two Branch Marina, situated in one of the hardest hit areas, had as many as

50 boats damaged. "I've never seen anything like this," said Diane Krause, office manager. She said repairing and rebuilding the docks would take months to complete.



GUATEMALA

Guatemala City, Dec 3 — A moderate earthquake struck off the Pacific coast of Guatemala today and was felt strongly in the Central American country's western highlands, although no damage was immediately reported. The U.S. Geological Survey reported on its Web site that a 5.8 magnitude quake struck at 1552, EST, 60 miles south-west of the capital Guatemala City. Eddie Sanchez, director of Guatemalan geological center Insivumeh said there were no reports of damage. — Reuters.

INDONESIA

London, Dec 1 — A strong earthquake measuring 6.3 hit the northern part of Indonesia's Sumatra island today but it was at a depth of 215km. The epicentre of the quake, which struck at 1458, AEDT, was 50km south-east of the city of Medan, the US Geological Survey said.

TONGA

London, Dec 2 — A report, dated today, states: A magnitude 5.7 earthquake occurred in lat 17.701S, long 174.352W, in Tonga at 0952, UTC, today. Depth 137 km.



MOUNT KARYMSKY, RUSSIA

London. Dec 4 — A press report, dated today, states: The Karymsky volcano on the Kamchatka peninsula in Russia's Far East has increased its activity, spewing ash up to an altitude of 6,900 metres (22,637 feet), the local emergencies centre said today. The ash and gas emissions were registered by a local aircraft, the emergencies centre said. The emissions pose no threat to local residents, but there is a danger to aircraft flying near the volcano, the emergencies centre said.



AFGHANISTAN

Kandahar, Afghanistan, Dec 3 — At least eight people were killed in the

southern Afghan city of Kandahar toay in a suicide car bombing against NATO troops and subsequent gunfire by soldiers, police and witnesses said. Three civilians died when the bomber struck a military convoy and five more were shot by troops afterwards, they said. NATO said three of its soldiers were wounded in the attack for which the Taliban claimed responsibility. Asked about the accounts of troops shooting civilians, NATO spokesman Major Luke Knittig said: "We will establish the facts. It is still unclear in what way the troops reacted." Britain's Ministry of Defence said the three injured soldiers were British Royal Marines commandoes. It said one was seriously wounded and the others were in stable condition. "The convoy was attacked by a suspected suicide bomber in a vehicle, who attempted to ram the British vehicles. A number of Afghan civilians were also injured in the blast and at least two were killed," the ministry said. — Reuters.

Kabul, Dec 4 - NATO troops killed 70-80 Taliban in a fierce battle in southern Afghanistan, the alliance said today. A reconnaissance patrol hunting Taliban engaged a large group of fighters yesterday about 15 km from the village of Musa Qala in Helmand, a stronghold of the Islamist guerrillas and the main opium-growing province in the world's major supplier. In a four-hour battle backed by attack helicopters and close air support, the ground commander estimated 70-80 guerrillas were killed, a NATO spokesman said. There were no NATO casualties, but three soldiers from NATO's International Security Assistance Force were wounded during another clash earlier in the day. -Reuters.

Kandahar, Dec 5 — A suicide bomber ploughed his car into a convoy of NATO troops in Afghanistan's southern city of Kandahar today, wounding nine civilians and two soldiers, witnesses and officials said. It was the second such attack in three days. The troops immediately cordoned off the site of the attack on the western outskirts of the city and at least two helicopters were seen hovering in the sky, they said. Two NATO soldiers were wounded in the blast and two vehicles damaged, a spokesman for the organisation said. Both NATO and US-led troops are stationed in Kandahar, the main stronghold of Taliban militants who have unleashed a series of suicide attacks against foreign and Afghan forces this year. On Sunday (Dec 3), at least eight Afghan civilians were killed in a suicide car attack against NATO troops and in subsequent firing by the soldiers in Kandahar city. In neighbouring Helmand province, the opium capital of the world's biggest supplier, British Marines today launched an offensive against a Taliban-held valley, backed by Apache attack helicopters and B1 bombers. There were no initial reports of Marine casualties, but British troops said several Taliban were killed as part of

the sweep through wheatfields in Gamser district the south of the province. — Reuters.

Kandahar, Dec 6 — A suicide bomber attacked the office of a US-owned security company in southern Afghanistan today killing seven people, including two Americans, a government and company official said. The Taliban claimed responsibility for the blast outside the office of the Houston-based US Protection and Investigations (USPI) in Kandahar city. "The bomber was questioned by a security guard as to where he was going, in front of the office, and he blew himself up among company employees," Kandahar's police chief Esmatullah Alizai said. The employees had gathered for a regular morning briefing outside their office, which is opposite a base of Afghanistan's NATO security force, he said. Two of the victims were Americans working for the company. Five Afghans and the bomber were also killed. The company provides guards to protect foreign companies working on construction and infrastructure projects. It was the third suicide bomb attack in the city this week. Qari Mohammad Yousuf, a spokesman for the Taliban, said that the bomber was a member of the Islamist group which is battling to oust foreign forces. About 105 suicide bomb attacks this year have killed nearly 250 people, most of them civilians, according to the NATO force. More than 40,000 foreign troops, about half of them American, are in Afghanistan battling the Taliban and trying to ensure sufficient security for development to get going. Nearly 4,000 people have been killed in violence since January, including nearly 160 foreign troops. Most of the violence has taken place in the south and east, in areas near the border with Pakistan, from where the insurgents are getting help from militant allies. The level of violence has fallen to some extent in recent weeks since winter began, but the Taliban have vowed to renew their campaign in the spring. -Reuters.

London, Dec 1 — A press report, dated Nov 30, states: Ten suspected Islamist militants were killed in clashes with the Algerian army, which was conducting sweeps in remote mountainous regions, the Al Khabar newspaper reported today. The militants were killed in two separate clashes Tuesday (Nov 28) night in the neighbouring Biskra and Batna regions, some 250 miles southeast of the capital, Algiers. According to the report, the army was searching the area for several dozen militants thought to be responsible for the downing of a military helicopter in the Batna region last week - an attack that killed three soldiers and two local

BANGLADESH

Dhaka, Dec 3 — Clashes broke out between rival political activists across Bangladesh again today as the fourth transport blockade in as many weeks gripped the country just weeks ahead of elections. One man was killed and 30 were injured in the latest spate of violence. President Iajuddin Ahmed called his council of advisers to a special meeting to try to resolve the stalemate between longtime rivals Sheikh Hasina, head of the Awami League, and Begum Khaleda Zia of the Bangladesh Nationalist Party (BNP). "The meeting has been convened to consider demands of the two major alliances," a spokesman for the presidential palace said. Adviser Mahbubul Alam, head of the information ministry, said "we expect to evolve a deal acceptable to both camps." Hasina and Khaleda met the president and his council of advisers late yesterday but they failed to resolve the stalemate. Hasina's 14party alliance demands the removal of controversial election officials and says voting lists for the January poll are flawed. Witnesses said road links between the capital Dhaka and the port city of Chittagong, as well as other main cities, were paralysed as the latest blockade took hold early today, a working day in mainly Muslim Bangladesh. Riot police and paramilitary troops patrolled the streets and guarded key buildings in the city of 10 million people. One man was killed and 20 injured in clashes in Biswanath, near Sylhet city 350 km north-east of Dhaka, witnesses said. At least 10 people were hurt when police used clubs to disperse activists attacking vehicles in Dhaka's Paltan area. — Reuters.

London, Dec 4 — A press report, dated today, states: A leader of Jatiyatabadi Chhatra Dal was killed and over 50 were injured in clashes between rival political activists in Sylhet as the fourth round of countrywide indefinite transport blockade by the 14-party combine began yesterday. The 14-party enforced the blockade demanding President Iajuddin's resignation from the post of chief adviser of the caretaker government and reconstitution of the Election Commission. Chittagong port sources said the loading and unloading of goods inside the port ran as usual but cargo delivery to and from the port remained suspended since the morning due to the disruption of road and rail communications.

CHAD

London, Dec 1 — A press report, dated Nov 30, states: French fighter jets bombed a rebel-held town in Central African Republic today, and rebels pulled troops out of another town after fighting with government forces, a rebel official said. Rebel forces withdrew from the northern town of Ouadda after clashes with government troops backed by a small Central African peacekeeping force, Diego Albator Yao, who is in charge of rebel military operations, said by

telephone from an undisclosed location. Elsewhere, French jets and helicopters attacked rebel positions in nearby Ndele, but rebels still held the town, Yao said. There was no immediate confirmation from French officials, but French firepower has put rebels on the run in recent days. A French military spokesman said earlier this week that French Mirage fighters fired on rebel positions in Birao in support of an army operation there, and Yao confirmed rebel troops pulled out of the town Tuesday (Nov 28) after two days of clashes. Yao said rebel forces pulled out of Ouadda fearing a French onslaught. Ouadda, however, was not attacked by French forces, he said. "I asked my men to pull out of Ouadda and leave it to government forces," Yao said. "It is useless to confront them given that the French are intervening with helicopters and jet fighters." After pulling out of Birao and Ouadda, insurgents still hold three towns: Ndele, Ouadda-Djalle and Sam Ouandja.

London, Dec 1 — A press report, dated Nov 30, states: Fiji's military chief Cmdr Frank Bainimarama has warned he will overthrow government tomorrow, unless his demands are met. Cmdr Bainimarama accused Prime Minister Laisenia Qarase of stalling on a pledge to scrap controversial legislation. Fiji has been tense for weeks amid a stand-off between the two men. "I think it's about time we end this impasse, Cmdr Bainimarama told a press conference, adding that it would be a 'peaceful transition". Prime Minister Qarase had earlier appeared to back down by agreeing to suspend work on the laws, one of which would grant amnesties to those involved in a 2000 coup. He also hinted that possible sedition charges against Cmdr Bainimarama could be dropped, and Fiji's police chief's work contract might not be renewed when it expired, but Cmdr Bainimarama - who wants the police chief removed immediately appeared to reject the concessions at a press conference. Cmdr Bainimarama reiterated his ultimatum and said that unless the government met all of the army's demands fully, all cabinet ministers and advisers should resign. "I give him until tomorrow afternoon to comply with our demands or I will start the clean-up campaign," he was quoted as saying. Cmdr Bainimarama said the government had until 1200 hrs, tomorrow (0000, UTC) to act. Fijians have been buying emergency supplies of food and withdrawing money from banks, amid fears a military coup could bring chaos and closures.

London, Dec 5 — The BBC reported today: Fiji's president has dissolved the island's parliament, paving the way for the military to take control in a coup. Earlier, armed troops surrounded the home of Prime Minister Laisenia Qarase, who is refusing to resign. Military chief Cmdr

Frank Bainimarama has repeatedly threatened to unseat Mr Qarase over plans to grant amnesty to those behind a coup in 2000. Cmdr Bainimarama is expected to give a television address in the coming hours. This morning, Mr Qarase said that he expected to be taken into custody shortly. The embattled elected leader refuses to step down voluntarily. "I am at home but there are soldiers at the gate negotiating their way to come in," Mr Qarase said from his complex in the centre of the capital, Suva. He said Fiji's powerful Pacific neighbours Australia and New Zealand had "flatly said no" to sending military support after the Fijian police were disarmed on Monday. New Zealand's prime minister has said that she feared military intervention could have made the situation worse. Checkpoints have already been set up across the capital, in what Mr Qarase described as a "strangling of the government of the day". Cmdr Bainimarama is angry at the way Mr Qarase has handled the aftermath of a coup in 2000, offering an amnesty to those responsible. Mr Qarase says that at least 800 of those involved have already been convicted. Australia, Britain and New Zealand have advised their citizens to stay away from the tourism-dependent former British colony. They have also warned of dire social, economic and diplomatic consequences if the military completes its coup. Fiji has seen three coups in the last 20 years.

IRAQ

Baghdad, Dec 3 - US forces attacked insurgent bases in Iraq today as a leaked memo from the man who sent them there revealed that Donald Rumsfeld believes their strategy is not working and it may be better to reduce troop numbers. A day before election defeat cost Rumsfeld his job, the outgoing defence secretary told the White House: "It is time for a major adjustment. Clearly, what US forces are currently doing in Iraq is not working well enough or fast enough.' The Pentagon confirmed the contents of the note, published by the New York Times, in which Rumsfeld, a leading planner of the Iraq war, outlined several options but endorsed none. It was sent on Nov 6, a day before voter dismay on Iraq gave control of Congress to President George W. Bush's Democratic opponents. Among options mentioned by Rumsfeld were reductions in US forces and bases and a recasting of the US goals there. He suggested cutting US bases to just five from 55 by mid-2007. Fifty-one people were killed at a busy Baghdad market yesterday by a triple car bomb attack, 10 days after the worst attack of the conflict killed over 200 people in the capital. US troops and Iraqi forces were on the offensive in Baquba, a volatile city 60 km north-east of Baghdad, the military said in a statement. Baquba has seen Sunni insurgents, including al Qaeda Islamist militants, driving out Shi'ite Muslims, while Shi'ite militias have attacked Sunnis in surrounding areas. Three rebels were killed and 44 detained in the offensive, the military said. In Anbar province, another centre of the Sunni insurgency, a US air strike and ground raid killed six insurgents, as well as two women and a child, the military said. Police in the area said 20 were killed. — Reuters.

Baghdad, Dec 5 — Gunmen and bombers killed 30 people in Baghdad today, including 14 Shi'ite religious workers after a powerful Iraqi Shi'ite leader urged President George Bush to strike harder at Sunni rebels to avert civil war. Gunmen killed the 14 employees of a Shi'ite religious foundation in the capital, while officials said three car bombs killed 16 people and wounded 25 in a separate attack near a fuel station in a religiously mixed area in southern Baghdad. The civilian employees for the Shi'ite Endowment, a foundation that oversees religious sites and mosques, were killed when their bus was ambushed, Salah Abdul Razzaq, a spokesman for the organisation, said. "Ît's clear that this crime is aimed at stoking sectarian strife among Iraqis. The terrorists are trying to portray these crimes as a sectarian conflict. he said. Razzaq said 14 employees were killed and eight wounded when gunmen forced the bus to stop on a highway in Qahira district. Interior Ministry sources said gunmen first set off a car bomb and then sprayed the bus with bullets. The sources put the toll at 15 employees dead and seven wounded. The attack came a day after Abdul Aziz al-Hakim, a cleric and head of the biggest party in Iraq's government, SCIRI, met Bush in Washington as Iraqi and US officials struggle to contain violence pitching the country towards all-out civil war. Iraq is gripped by tit-for-tat sectarian killings between Shi'ites and Sunnis, and many Iraqis fear their oil-rich nation passed the point of no return into sectarian division after the destruction of a Shi'ite shrine in February. Last month, gunmen attacked a vehicle of the Sunni Endowment near the southern city of Basra, killing one local official and three of his bodyguards. In a clear sign of American alarm at escalating violence, the US ambassador in Baghdad and the commander of US forces implored Iraqis to break a cycle of violence which they said would destroy the country. Last month, more than 200 Shi'ites were killed in the worst bombing since the US invasion. - Reuters.

ISRAEL-LEBANON

Hebron, Dec 1 — Israeli forces shot dead a Palestinian in the West Bank today and Palestinian militants in Gaza fired a rocket into the Jewish state, despite a partial truce declared by armed groups in the territory. An Israeli army spokesman said a Palestinian man threw a petrol bomb at Israeli border police manning a security roadblock in the West Bank city of Hebron, lightly wounding one of the officers. Israeli forces shot at him

and killed him. Palestinian hospital officials confirmed the man's death. His family said he had gone out early to pray at a local mosque and that he did not belong to a militant group. The army spokesman said the man was found to have been carrying a knife. Also today, a rocket fired by Palestinian militants in Gaza landed in southern Israel, said the Israeli army and witnesses quoted by Israeli media. There were no reports of casualties or an immediate claim of responsibility. Palestinian militant groups had earlier in the week said they would halt such attacks if Israel stopped targeting Palestinians in the West Bank and Gaza. After their declaration, Israel ended a massive five-month-long offensive in Gaza. U.S. Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice, visiting the region to try to revive long-stalled peace talks, pushed Israelis and Palestinians vesterday to broaden their fragile Gaza ceasefire. The Palestinians have also been bogged down by internal disputes and some violence, mainly over unpaid government salaries, after Western nations froze funding to the Palestinian Authority after Hamas won a parliamentary election in January. Early today, unknown assailants detonated explosives at the entrance to a Gaza branch of the Arab Bank, causing damage to a part of the building, Palestinian security sources said. The motive for the bombing, the first against a foreign-operated bank in the Palestinian territories, was unclear and there was no claim of responsibility. — Reuters.

NIGERIA

London, Dec 7 — Operations at Brass Terminal have been suspended following an attack by militants. According to local reports, the terminal came under attack and some people were taken hostage in the early hours of this morning. As a result, terminal operations have been suspended. However, the loading of a vessel currently at the SBM has not been affected. It is not yet clear if another 'force majeure' will be declared by the Terminal Operators, in addition to the one still in force from the previous incidents at the terminal this year.

PAKISTAN

Karachi, Dec 1 — In a recent terrorist attack on gas infrastructure, a main pipeline supplying gas to the Sui purification plant of Pakistan Petroleum Ltd in Balochistan Province was blown up late last night. A report said suspected militants blew up the pipeline at at least five points. As a result, gas supplies to the main gas plant were suspended from the pipeline, an official said, adding that gas supplies to other areas of the country had not been affected. — Lloyd's List Correspondent.

PHILIPPINES

Manila, Dec 1 — At least four Philippine soldiers were killed and three were wounded when communist

rebels detonated a landmine on the troubled southern island of Mindanao, said an army general today. Brigadier-General Luini Mirar, military commander in Surigao provinces, said the soldiers were rushing to a detachment under attack communist New People's Army (NPA) rebels in Marihatag town in Surigao del Sur when they were attacked. "We lost four men when the rebels set off a landmine in Cagwait town," Mirar said, adding that three soldiers who were wounded managed to fight back and prevented the guerrillas from taking their weapons. The army truck was a wreck and an armoured vehicle was slightly damaged in the attack, Mirar added. Mirar said extra troops were sent to chase the rebels and evacuate the wounded soldiers to the nearest army base. — Reuters.

SOMALIA

London, Dec 1 — A press report, dated Nov 30, states: A car bomb has exploded in Baidoa, where Somalia's fragile interim government is based, leaving at least six people dead. A policeman said that a female suicide bomber wearing a veil blew herself up at a check-point. There are fears of widespread conflict breaking out in Somalia between the government and the Union of Islamic Courts (UIC), which controls most of the south of the country, including the capital, Mogadishu. There have been conflicting reports of how many bombs there were. Deputy Defence Minister Salad Ali Jelle told the AP news agency that three car bombs had exploded at police check-points, killing the drivers and three others. A local journalist said he had seen three bodies. Police commander General Ali Hussein told AFP that at least 12 people had died. "There were two suicide cars full of explosives," he said. Mr Salad also told AP that three alleged attackers had been captured. He said they were foreign members of al-Qaeda.

SUDAN

Abuja, Nov 30 — The African Union (AU) today extended the mandate of its peacekeeping force in Sudan's Darfur region for six months, after Sudan rejected proposals for the deployment of a larger U.N. force to replace it. The authorisation of about 7,000 AU troops in the vast desert region had been due to expire at the end of the year. "The (AU) peace and security council decided to renew the mandate for six months," AU peace and security commissioner Said Djinit said after a council meeting in Nigeria's capital Abuja. The council, consisting of five African heads of state, endorsed a proposal for a hybrid AU and United Nations force to replace the poorly equipped and thinly spread AU troops, but conceded some ground to Khartoum by deciding that the UN should have only a supporting role. "By hybrid we mean ... the mission should be essentially African troops, but there might be a case for support elements of the United

Nations in areas where the AU is not in a position to provide those elements," Djinit said. He added that this support would ensure the force had the strength to ensure security in Darfur, deliver humanitarian assistance and protect civilians. The AU decision left unclear how many peacekeepers Khartoum will allow into Darfur. The U.N. Security Council and Secretary-General Kofi Annan have said as many as 22,000 may be needed, compared to the 7,000 AU soldiers now there. The AU peace and security council said force size should be determined by the AU and the United Nations based on the needs on the ground. But U.N. officials, speaking on condition of anonymity, said Sudanese President Omar Hassan al-Bashir wrote Annan earlier today to say that Khartoum also required a voice in the decision-making. Experts estimate that 200,000 people have been killed and 2.5 million uprooted in nearly four years by the violence. Reuters.

Khartoum, Dec 3 — At least 150 people were killed and 400 to 500 wounded in heavy clashes in south Sudan last week between former rebels and the Sudanese army, a United Nations official said today. Peter Maxwell, head of the UN field office in Malakal, said that most of the dead were combatants but that 20-30 were civilians caught in the crossfire. The fighting that erupted on Nov 28 in the town of Malakal was the heaviest between the northern Khartoum government and the former rebels since a peace deal last year ended Africa's longest-running civil war. "There have been about 150 deaths .. and between 400 and 500 wounded," Maxwell said. A senior officer from the former rebel Sudan People's Liberation Army had earlier said hundreds of people may have been killed. — Reuters.



INDIA

London, Dec 2 — A press report, dated today, states: Normal life came to a grinding halt in Manipur today following a day-long general strike called by various organisations to coincide with Prime Minister's Manmohan Singh's visit here. Officials said markets, shops, business establishments, educational institutions remained closed in view of the general strike called by Action Committee Against Tipaimukh Project (ACATP) and major insurgent outfit Revolutionary People's Front (RPF). They said transport services between Manipur and neighbouring states, and within the state were also cancelled in view of the strike. While ACATP had called the strike in protest against proposal to construct a dam at Tipaimukh in interior Churachandpur

district, RPF called the general strike saying that Singh's visit "was aimed at encouraging the security forces to commit atrocities under Armed Forces Act now in force in the State." Major roads in Imphal wore a deserted look as people preferred to remain indoors in view of the general strike.

London, Dec 5 — A press report, dated today, states: The three-day old indefinite strike by tanker lorry operators in Kerala, protesting against the state government's decision to make speed governors mandatory in heavy vehicles, was called off. The strike was called off after the Ernakulam district Collector A P M Mohammed Hanish and other officials met leaders of the Kerala state tanker lorry owners Federation. Hanish later told reporters that the federation's decision followed the request of the government, which said that the strike would hit people hard, especially as the Sabarimala, Haj and Christmas season was on.

PHILIPPINES

Manila, Dec 6 — Cargo operations at the domestic port of Dumaguete in Negros Oriental in central Philippines has been paralysed since Friday (Dec 1)because of an on-going strike by stevedores servicing the port. Some 150 stevedores have stopped work to pressure the state-Philippine Ports Authority to renegotiate their Collective Bargaining Agreement which expired two years ago. The stevedores have refused to load and unload cargo from docked vessels but have allowed passengers board and disembark from passenger ferries. Dumaguete Port is the main port for the province of Negros Oriental. -Lloyd's Agents.

SOUTH KOREA

London, Dec 4 — A press report, dated today, states: About 1,600 truck drivers continued to strike for four days in a row today but it did not seriously disrupt cargo transportation in the country, officials said. The Korea Cargo Transport Workers Union said, however, that its members will continue the strike until the National Assembly adoptes a bill that calls for a minimum shipping charge and a cap on brokerage fees which will ensure higher income for them. The union claims a membership of 12,000 out of 300,000 truck drivers in the country. Government officials filled the gap by mobilizing as many non-union drivers as possible. But officials are concerned that an increasing number of nonunion drivers stayed away, as some of their trucks were set ablaze by apparent arsons by the striking drivers. Overall, container cargo transportation at major ports and inland depots was running at 70% to 90% of the usual level, said officials at the Ministry of Construction and Transportation. The government deployed more police to protect trucks on highways.

London, Dec 5 — A press report, dated today, states: South Korean truckers terminated their five-day

strike that has seen outbreaks of arson and agreed to return to work today, their union said. The Korea Cargo Transport Workers Union said the decision was made after the National Assembly's Construction Transportation Committee agreed to review related legislation that favours the truckers next February. About 1,600 drivers were on a five-day strike starting Friday (Dec 1), demanding that the National Assembly adopt a bill that calls for a minimum shipping charge and a cap on brokerage fees that guarantess them higher income. Police said today they have received reports of 79 incidents, including property damage and injuries, caused by trucks being set ablaze. The truckers allegedly turned to arson to press non-union drivers to stop ferrying cargo between ports and depots, officials said.



THEFT OF INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY, GERMANY

London, Dec 6 — A press report, dated Dec 5, states: Husky Injection Molding Systems Ltd said today it had won a US\$11-million court award in an intellectual property case in Germany against Mold & Hotrunner Technology, a German competitor founded by former Husky employees. Husky accused Mold & Hotrunner, based in Hochheim, Germany, of illegally using Husky's computer-aided design files to make its pre-form moulds. Husky, founded by German immigrant Robert Schad headquartered in Bolton, north of Toronto, said the German Appeal Court made the award last week for damages and interest from the theft and illegal use of Husky's technology, ending a case that had gone on for five years. Husky, whose equipment is used to manufacture a wide range of plastic products in packaging, technical and automotive applications, said the court denied the right to appeal the decision, but Mold & Hotrunner may challenge this denial.



BHAGALPUR, BIHAR STATE, INDIA

London, Dec 3 — A press report, dated today, states: Twenty-four people were killed when a 150-year-old bridge collapsed on an overcrowded super fast train in Bihar's Bhagalpur district early yesterday. Mammoth slabs of metal and cement thundered over a sleeper class of the Howrah-

Jamalpur train coming from Howrah in West Bengal and on its way to Jamalpur in Bihar, barely 50 km from its destination. The disaster crushed many passengers, many of whom were travelling illegally on the roof of the coaches and hanging on the doors, and seriously wounding many. The aged bridge, "Ulta Pul," was being dismantled when it suddenly came down on the train. According to villagers, a portion of the damaged bridge was hanging loosely but trains continued to run underneath, unaware of the danger lurking overhead. Yesterday, reverberations from the plying of the train apparently caused the bridge to simply come apart. Until now, there are 24 bodies lying in the Bhagalpur government hospital and at a district the railway station," administration official said. However, unconfirmed reports say that 34 people have been killed. Over 30 people were rescued and a dozen injured admitted to the hospital. S.Majumdar, chief spokesman of Eastern Railways, said that rescue workers were struggling to extricate bodies from the mangled coach. "Initially we thought there was only one casualty, because only the toilet part of the S-8 coach was crushed. Now it seems people were sitting on the train roof and also hanging to its sides," he said by telephone from Kolkata. Railway Minister Lalu Prasad ordered a probe into the accident and announced a compensation of Rs100,000 to families of the dead besides promising a job in the government. Thousands of people crowded around the accident site, hampering rescue operations. By late afternoon railway officials had pressed giant cranes to take out the crushed rail carriage and resume rail traffic on the section.

London, Dec 4 — A press report, dated today, states: The Commissioner for Railway Safety (Eastern Circle), R.P. Agarwal, today began a probe into Saturday's (Dec 2) train crash in Bhagalpur that claimed 35 lives. Agarwal, accompanied by Eastern Railway General Manager, S S Khurana. and the Divisional Railway Manager (Malda), R K Mishra, visited the accident site this morning and later began taking statements from railway employees and others at Bhagalpur junction, railway sources said. Agarwal, who will hold a statutory inquiry into the accident today and tomorrow, will also take statements from the public in connection with the accident. The Eastern Railway has put up advertisement in prominent newspapers asking members of the public who have knowledge relating to the accident, or related matters, to appear and give evidence at the inquiry. Railway Minister Lalu Prasad ordered the probe to ascertain responsibility for the lapses causing the incident.

CHRISTOPHER AREA, ILLINOIS, UNITED STATES

London, Dec 4 — A press report, dated today, states: A Union Pacific

derailed freight train near Christopher, southern Illinois, early today, spilling an unknown chemical and forcing the evacuation of more than 70 homes. There were no reports of injuries, said Union Pacific spokesman James Barnes. "It did result in the release of a chemical, Barnes said. "We're trying to determine what kind of chemical." Two locomotives and 21 cars of the 83-car train left the tracks around 0235 hrs, Barnes said. The train was headed to Chicago from Houston. A hazardous material team was on the scene of the derailment, said John Hampton, a West Frankfort police and fire dispatcher. More than 70 homes in the area of Mitchell Lake were evacuated, Barnes said. The cause of the derailment has not been determined.

London, Dec 5 — A press report, dated today, states: An 80-car Union Pacific train transporting hazardous material derailed near Zeigler early yesterday morning sending 21 railroad cars careening off the track and resulting in the evacuation of approximately 100 residents. The derailment also resulted in an extended weekend for approximately 600 students in the Zeigler-Royalton Unit K-12 complex that is less than three miles from the site. Ryan Buckingham, director of Franklin County Emergency Management, said the exact location of the derailment is approximately two miles south of Christopher and two miles east of Illinois 148. The derailment took place near Mitchell Lake, causing additional concern for emergency and hazardous material workers. Approximately 70 homes were evacuated to a temporary shelter set up at the Christopher Community Center. James Barnes, director of media relations with Union Pacific Railroad, said the cause of the derailment is under investigation. Barnes said it may take the company days before the wreckage is removed and the railway repaired for further use. Barnes also confirmed that phenol was spilled in the derailment. Immediately after the derailment Franklin County authorities quickly cordoned off the site. Speaking at a press conference held at the community center, Craig Lemmon, a lieutenant with the West Frankfort Fire Department, said he received the initial call at 0250 hrs and responded to the scene. Lemmon said the force of the derailment had pushed some railroad cars on top of other cars. Lemmon said three of the 21 cars that overturned were carrying hazardous products. There are no fires involved with the derailment and the spilled liquid is confined to a single area, Lemmon said. There is also no danger of any contamination to Mitchell Lake, located only a short distance from the

London, Dec 6 — A press report, dated today, states: The clean-up of a chemical spill resulting from the derailment early Monday morning (Dec 4) of a Union Pacific train was well under way today. The derailment of the 80-car train around 0235

Monday in the Mitchell Lake area of rural Franklin County forced the voluntary evacuation of 70 homes and approximately 100 residents living in the affected area. Roads closed immediately after the derailment but were reopened at around 1600 Monday to local residents wishing to return to their homes. Two diesel engines and a couple of dozen cars left the tracks, including three tanker cars containing hazardous chemicals. Two different chemicals leaked from tanker cars, officials said. They were identified as para-nonylphenol, a corrosive detergent used on metal finishes, and lubrizol, a lubricant. Franklin County Sheriff Bill Wilson said the chemicals were contained near the site of the derailment and were not a threat to the water supply. The sheriff said Union Pacific quickly assembled heavy equipment to work on the derailment and also brought in hazardous material and other environmental experts from throughout the country to supervise the clean-up. The sheriff said fewer than a dozen people were treated at area hospitals after complaining of eye, throat, nose and skin irritations. No one was seriously injured, and all were treated and released.



FAILURE OF AIR TRAFFIC CONTROL SYSTEM, FLORIDA, UNITED STATES

London, Dec 6 — A press report, dated Dec 5, states: A computerised air traffic system experienced a temporary outage in South Florida, forcing controllers to ground some flights and resulting in at least four instances in which aircraft almost came too close together, officials said today. Yesterday's outage affecting the Miami Centre radar complex lasted about an hour, but a back-up system was activated and flights in the air were not in danger, said Kathleen Bergen, a Federal Aviation Administration spokeswoman in Atlanta. "There was never a loss of communication with flights and controllers did not lose their radar displays," Bergen said. Still, the outage caused confusion and tension among controllers in Miami, who had trouble establishing and maintaining aircraft identification because enough flight plan information was not available through their computers, said Steven Wallace, president of the National Air Traffic Controllers' Association in Miami. The problem was caused by failure of a telecommunications cable linking high-altitude air traffic control centres in Miami and San Juan, Puerto Rico, Bergen said. Bergen said that as a precaution the FAA grounded about 60 flights controlled by Miami Centre at airports in Florida and at Nassau, Bahamas. The average delay was about 30 minutes, he said. Wallace said there were four cases in which aircraft almost violated FAA rules that flights at high altitudes must remain at least five miles apart horizontally and 1,000 feet vertically.



ALAMO (Panama)

London, Dec 1 — Bulker Alamo (11751 gt, built 1971), situation as Nov 6: Alamo has been at anchor at Malabo with 15 Indian crew on board for 1.5 months. The crew are surviving on rice and lentils, last supply was two weeks ago when the owners sent \$1,500 of which \$400 was spent for boat hire. No fresh water on board. No more diesel oil for the generators with daily black out. Crew are desperate to go home, EC expired. Three crew are sick, one of them, the second engineer, was recently rushed to the hospital due to malaria. Crew are paying for the cost. The crew have not been paid for 13 months and are owed an outstanding payment of approxiamtely \$110,000.

NUMO (Panama)

London, Dec 1 — Salvage tug *Numo* (363 gt, built 1967) was reported at Aden Sep 22 with 11 Indian crew not having been paid for nine and a half months. The owner was contacted by ITF. He continues to promise that he will pay, but nothing delivered. Later, a call was received from the crew that the owner had stopped supplying food and water. In addition the vessel is in poor condition. On Oct 31 the owner paid 95% of crews wages. Apparently the rest will be paid next week and crew are to receive tickets to fly home.

OUTBREAK OF VIRUS ON BAHAMAS VESSEL

Miami, dec 3 — Royal Caribbean Cruises said, today, that 338 out of 3,823 passengers and 46 out of 1,402 crew on their passenger (cruise) Freedom of the Seas (154407 gt, built 2006) came down with what was believed to be a norovirus, a gastrointestinal ailment, brought on board by a passenger. The vessel returned to Miami, today, after completing a seven-day cruise to Mexico, the Cayman Islands, Jamaica and Haiti. Royal Caribbean said those affected were treated with an over-thecounter medication and responded well. — Reuters.



BUSH, AUSTRALIA

London, Dec 2 — A press report, dated today, states: Wildlife rescuers fear for a large koala population in the Pilliga Nature Reserve, in central NSW, where bushfires continue to rage out of control. The Pilliga koala colony is one of Australia's most genetically diverse, spread across a vast tract of bushland. The fire is burning across a 30-kilometre front and more than 100,000 hectares of scrub have been burnt. Victorian and Queensland crews joined thousands of firefighters and the aircraft struggling to contain 24 uncontrolled fires across the state. The worst continue to burn around Mudgee and Coonabarabran, the largest threatening a large koala population in the Pilliga Nature Reserve. The Rural Fire Service is not hopeful of containing the central western fires by the end of the weekend. A southerly change late tomorrow is expected to bring some relief to tinderbox conditions in the drought-stricken area. A total 70 fires are smouldering across NSW, including large contained blazes in the Hawkesbury and Blue Mountains.

London, Dec 5 — A press report, dated today, states: Australia is seeking 100 New Zealand firefighters to help battle 50 out of control bushfires. Australian firefighters fear dozens of bushfires, in remote mountains in the south-east, could join up to form major fire-fronts, driven by hot weather in the droughtplagued region. Nearly firefighters are battling the fires, which are being driven by strong winds. New Zealand National Rural Fire Officer Murray Dudfield said it was likely between 40 and 50 would be able to go in the first deployment to Australia. The out of control fires have been sweeping across Victoria, with bushfires scorching 12,000 hectares in remote state forest and the Alpine National Park in Gippsland. Nearly 2,000 firefighters battled more than 50 blazes in rugged, inaccessible mountains of Victoria state, as temperatures rose above 30C (86 Fahrenheit). "We are headed for probably the worst fire summer period we have ever had in Victoria. We don't expect these fires to go out," state Premier Steve Bracks said. Tourists were urged not to visit the popular Victorian Alps, where blazes have already destroyed more than 12,000 hectares (30,000 acres) of bushland. As authorities moved to scramble water-bombing more heavv helicopters, firefighters said strong winds and high temperatures over coming days could fan the fronts and push fires more than 20 kilometres (12 miles) from current positions. "It's

expected in the next couple of days some of these fires will join together and form larger fires," environment department spokesman Kevin Monk said. In neighbouring New South Wales, fire crews were fighting blazes threatening to wipe out one of the last remaining outposts of healthy koalas. The fires are burning in the Pilliga scrub nature reserve, 350 km northwest of Sydney. The Pilliga fire closed a 118 kilometre stretch of one of Australia's major arterial roads, the Newell Highway, between Narrabri and Coonabarabran. In the tinder-dry South Australian riverland, more than 170 firefighters were still struggling to control a blaze sparked by lightning, which has burnt more than 115,000 hectares of scrub. (See issue of Dec 5.)

London, Dec 6 — A press report, dated today, states: Wildlife rescuers said one of Australia's largest and most important koala colonies has survived a huge bushfire that swept through its habitat in central western NSW. Thousands of koalas came under threat from the blaze, which broke out in the Pilliga Nature Reserve, near Coonabarabran, three weeks ago. The fire already has scorched more than 82,600 hectares and firefighters are still days away from containing it. Firefighters still battling the blaze and performing clean-up duties will notify local wildlife rescue services of any injured koalas. Warmer weather was expected for NSW over the next few days, but the Rural Fire Service did not expect it to worsen current fire conditions. Hot and windy weather moving through Victoria has fanned more than 40 bushfires there. That weather pattern had affected parts of southern NSW and was expected to move east towards the Tasman Sea.

London, Dec 7 — A press report, dated today, states: Army tankers and bulldozers will be brought in to support crews fighting bushfires across Victoria's north-east. The federal government would help the Victorian government in controlling major bushfires in the state. The assistance includes army fuel tankers to supply diesel for water tankers and bulldozers in the Mansfield-Whitfield region. Because of the difficult terrain and road conditions in the area, army tankers and their crews will provide fuel supply support through the next few days and until the fires are under control. Up to 50 fires have ripped through 90,000 hectares. The fires are being tackled by 2,000 firefighters bolstered by bulldozers and aircraft. At least two houses and a shed have been destroyed in the bushfires that have gripped the state's north-east and Gippsland since Friday (Dec1). Yesterday, an unoccupied house was burnt to the ground at Rose River, near Abbeyard, when two fires merged into a 1,600-hectare blaze. An unoccupied holiday house burnt near a containment line of the Black Range fire on Tuesday. A shed in Jamieson was also razed on Monday. Towns in north-eastern Victoria and Gippsland remain on high alert as separate bushfires threaten to join and create

giant blazes. The fires would continue burning in an easterly direction today, with fire crews focused on protecting property and life. The biggest fire is in the Heyfield district, east of Howitt Plains, which has scorched almost 27.000 hectares of national parkland. There had been no further reports of property damage overnight, although a plantation had burnt near the Black Range fire. A deployment of 40 firefighters from New Zealand was expected to arrive this evening to support the firefighting effort. The fires are expected to worsen over the next few days and into the weekend with the temperature to reach 37 degrees on Saturday (Dec 9).

BUSH, TASMANIA

London, Dec 6 — A press report, dated today, states: The Tasmania Fire Service said light rain, which fell on a fire burning close to Bream Creek, east of Hobart, has had little impact. The fire started late yesterday and has burnt out about 800 hectares of bushland. There are several road closures in the area and residents are again being urged to activate their bushfire plan. The fire is burning in rugged country in thick bush, crossing the Wielangta Road at the Marion Bay Lookout. District fire officer Gerald Crawford said the fire threat is very real. "It has burnt over 2,000 hectares and there is a small amount of rain there this morning, but not enough to be of any significance," he said. "We anticipate being able to get some dozer lines in on one of the sectors today to start back-burning operations, maybe this evening, depending on the weather." Meanwhile a fire burning near Elderslie, in the Derwent Valley, has burnt out 900 hectares of bush.

FIREWORKS FACTORY, SHORTGATE, SUSSEX, UNITED KINGDOM

London, Dec 3 — Two firefighters were killed and 12 other people injured when a fireworks warehouse in southern England caught fire and exploded today, officials said. Witnesses said a series of blasts shook the warehouse at Shortgate, East Sussex, as the fire raged and cascades of fireworks exploded in the night sky hours afterwards. Two firemen were killed in a large explosion about an hour after the fire began, Jeremy Paine, assistant chief constable of Sussex police, said. Another 12 people were hurt, including nine firefighters, two members of the public and a police sergeant, he said. All were taken to hospital where some were later released. — Reuters.

London, Dec 4 — Bomb disposal experts have joined the search for potentially deadly gas cylinders at a fireworks depot destroyed in a blaze that killed two firemen. Police and fire chiefs said it was too early to say what caused the explosion and blaze at the warehouse near Lewes, East Sussex, yesterday. Investigators fear cylinders in the smouldering debris may still explode. A bomb disposal team is using a remote controlled vehicle to

look for cylinders within a 200-metre exclusion zone. "The scene is still potentially very dangerous," Fire Officer Des Prichard, of East Sussex Fire & Rescue Service, told a news conference. "We are taking a cautious approach." Nine firefighters, two members of the public and a police officer were injured in the blaze at Festival Fireworks in the village of Shortgate. The explosion and fire destroyed several buildings. Local people said they thought a bomb had gone off. Smoke and flames could be seen for miles around. Witnesses said a series of blasts shook the warehouse as the fire raged and cascades of fireworks exploded in the night sky for hours afterwards. Police and fire chiefs said an investigation would start once the depot is safe to enter. Reuters.

PLANT, MENOMONEE VALLEY, WISCONSIN, UNITED STATES

London, Dec 7 — a press report, dated Dec 6, states: An explosion at about 0815, this morning, levelled a building on Falk Corp's property, in the Menomonee Valley, Wisconsin, and killed at least three workers. The blast, which is being blamed on a propane leak, also injured 46 workers. Milwaukee Mayor Tom Barrett announced, in a press conference at 1700 hrs, that all workers had been accounted for. Milwaukee Police said there would have been more fatalities if Falk employees had not reported the propane leak prior to the explosion. The plant was being evacuated when the explosion occurred. Buildings on Falk's 61-acre site in the valley are still being searched. The Falk business occupies more than 1.5 million square feet on the site. The blast could be felt at various points throughout the city of Milwaukee and shook buildings in the Menomonee Valley and the south side of Milwaukee. Black smoke and flames could be seen shooting from the buildings near 30th and Canal streets earlier in the day. More than 120 firefighters and emergency medical personnel responded to the scene. West Milwaukee-based Rexnord Corp. owns and operates the plant. Rexnord purchased Falk in May, 2005. Falk provides power transmission components and systems to various heavy industries. About 700 employees across three shifts work at the Falk plant, 3001 W. Canal St. It remains unclear how many were on the site at the time the 50,000-square-foot building was destroyed in the explosion, Falk president David Doerr said. Early reports indicated that the blast occurred as work was being done on a large propane tank outside the plant. Fire officials said the cause of the blast remains under investigation and would not confirm that propane played a role in the explosion at the 1300hrs press conference. Milwaukee Health Commissioner Bevan Baker said air quality tests showed that the explosion and fire created no human health hazard. Larry Deuchers, a Falk employee, said the building that exploded was used as a storage

warehouse for tooling used in Falk's manufacturing operations. The police investigation is expected to take a week to complete. Investigators from the federal Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms and the Occupational Safety and Health Administration are also investigating.

WAREHOUSE, ISANTI, MINNESOTA, UNITED STATES

London, Dec 4 — A press report, dated today, states: The state Fire Marshal is investigating what sparked a fire that destroyed a warehouse full of home remodeling materials in Isanti. The warehouse in the town about 35 miles north of Minneapolis housed building materials for GMT Construction Company. The son of the firm's owner estimated the loss to the company at around one million dollars. Authorities say the warehouse did not have a sprinkler system, and there was an absence of water main fed fire hydrants outside as well. They say those were contributing factors in the building's loss.

WILDFIRES, UNITED STATES

London, Dec 4 — A press report, dated today, states: Hundreds of homes were threatened early today by a brush fire driven by powerful Santa Ana winds that destroyed five homes while sweeping through this Southern California bedroom community. The 15-square-mile fire also razed a storage building, said Ventura County Fire Capt. Barry Parker. Hundreds of residents packed valuables and fled authorities called for evacuations, while dozens of trailers used to transport livestock lined up along a road. Some residents stayed put despite 35-feet flames nearby. In one neighbourhood, the fire came within 100 yards of homes. The blaze began around 0230, Sunday (Dec 3) on the northwestern edge of Moorpark, a one-time farm town about 29 miles northwest of Los Angeles that has transformed into a bedroom community. It quickly burned through 9,700 acres of heavy brush and chaparral in hills dotted with horse ranches, tract homes, and eucalyptus, avocado and citrus groves on the city's outskirts. Flames sprung up again around 0700 near Moorpark, but fire officials later classified both fires as a single blaze known as the Shekell incident, although they were a couple of miles apart. A third fire burned south of Camarillo and was expected to be contained at 30 acres, authorities said. Hampered by 70-mph gusts, more than 1,000 firefighters aided by water-dropping helicopters focused more on protecting homes than containing the flames. Crews were bracing for winds up to 30 mph and gusts as high as 50 mph combined with low humidity today. A massive packaging plant was engulfed in flames and burnt for hours, occasionally letting off small explosions. In Riverside County, firefighters gained control of a wildfire that burned 100 acres of hillside brush. The fire, which began late

Saturday near a high school in Norco, was fanned by strong winds and caused one minor injury to a firefighter. The causes of the fires were under investigation.

London, Dec 5 — A press report, dated Dec 4, states: The desert winds that stoked a destructive wildfire diminished today, easing the threat from flames in this Southern California city where the blaze gutted five homes. The fire blackened about 15 square miles after erupting early yesterday, but the remaining homes in hilly Ventura County north-west of Los Angeles were safe, fire officials said. "It seems to be dying down, but we're not taking any chances," said Michael Jarvis, spokesman for the California Department of Forestry. The Santa Ana winds had earlier gusted as high as 50 mph. The improving weather allowed aircraft, including water-dropping helicopters, to join more than 1,500 firefighters battling the flames. "We're expecting to hit it hard from the air and from the ground," fire Capt Barry Parker said. The fire was 35% contained. With winds still gusting to 40 mph atop ridges, fire officials remained concerned about 500 properties, including citrus and avocado farms and cattle ranches. Firefighters sought to keep the fire boxed in a canvon. If the flames advanced south, they could move toward the small city of Camarillo. If they spread northwards, the blaze could threaten the city of Fillmore. The cause of the fire had not been determined. The fire fed on heavy brush and spread quickly across hills and canyons dotted with horse ranches and eucalyptus, avocado and citrus groves. No one has been injured. Piles of compost continued to burn at Peach Hill Soils, an organic recycling facility overrun last night by the fire. The owner estimated \$500,000 in losses. Two other fires also erupted early today about 90 miles to the east in the dangerously windy conditions, but those blazes were tackled by firefighters. In San Bernardino County, some firefighting equipment was being released from a 525-acre fire in Fontana, but fire crews planned to keep an eye on the site for several hours.

London, Dec 6 — A press report, dated Dec 5, states: Firefighters took advantage of calm weather today to douse smouldering hot spots and corralled a 13,600-acre wildfire that burned five homes in Ventura County. Ferocious weekend (Dec 2-3) winds had died to gentle breezes, allowing firefighters to douse smouldering hot spots left. There were no active flames by late afternoon today, Ventura County fire Capt Barry Parker said. The fire area was about 21 square miles with orchards, ranches and housing tracts. The area, north-west of Los Angeles, was expected to be fully controlled by Friday. A "red flag" warning of extreme fire conditions remained in place because of low humidity - less than 2% by dusk - that made brush extremely dry. The fire began early Sunday near a huge egg production facility that is now defunct. The cause was still being investigated. Residents who had fled were allowed to return and all roads were open today, fire officials said.



C-FEXS

London, Dec 6 — A press report, dated today, states: A report into a fatal aircraft crash near downtown Winnipeg said that icing was the main factor in the accident. The pilot, Nancy Chase-Allan, of Moncton, New Brunswick, died instantly but no one on the ground was hurt. Her Morningstar Air Express Cessna 208B (Grand Caravan) (C-FEXS) crashed shortly after take-off on Oct 6, 2005, after she radioed air traffic controllers that she needed to turn back because the aircraft was icing up. Icing conditions that day were considered moderate. The Transportation Safety Board report said Transport Canada should ban all Cessna 208 pilots from taking off or continuing to fly in anything more than light icing. The pilotøs family is suing Cessna, alleging negligence.

CANCELLATION OF FLIGHTS, BRAZIL

London, Dec 6 — A press report, dated today, states: Virtually all takeoffs from three major airports in Brazil were cancelled last night after an air traffic communications system broke down, making it difficult for controllers to communicate with pilots and creating air travel chaos. Brazil's Civil Aviation Authority said in a statement that takeoffs were banned at the airport in the capital of Brasilia and in the large central city of Belo Horizonte. Many takeoffs were also cancelled at the airport in Sao Paulo that handles domestic flights, though the authority allowed flights to continue on the busy Sao Paulo-Rio de Janeiro shuttle route. Authorities were still allowing aircraft to land at the three airports and almost all international flights departing Sao Paulo, Brazil's largest city, take off from a separate airport unaffected by the government order. But the Belo Horizonte and Brasilia airports also serve some international destinations, and all takeoffs were prohibited from those airports. The problem emerged when a communications system in Brasilia inexplicably broke down, reducing the number of radio frequencies and making it hard for controllers to reach pilots flying commercial jets in some of Brazil's busiest air traffic corridors, the government's Agencia Brasil news agency reported. Federal police discounted the possibility of sabotage, saying the problem appeared to be technical and that they would only investigate if asked by Brazil's military, which runs the air traffic control system in Latin America's largest country, Brazil's Agencia Estado news agency reported. The breakdown initially caused huge delays yesterday morning, prompting passengers to sleep on airport floors. Authorities decided later to cancel the takeoffs at the three airports until the communications system is repaired. The aviation authority said the system could be repaired by today, but warned travelers to check on flights with airlines and acknowledged that the incident was Brazil's most disruptive air traffic communications failure in history.

D-CGSP

London, Nov 30 — Grob SPn D-CGSP, operator Grob Aerospace, the second prototype of the Grob SPn business jet took off from the manufacturer's base at Mattsies Airport, Gewrmany for a demonstration flight. The aircraft crashed after a fly-by at 1315, Nov 29., killing the test pilot.

FLIGHTS SUSPENDED AT SHANGHAI AIRPORT, CHINA

London, Dec 1 — China suspended flights at Shanghai's international airport for at least several hours today "to control air traffic volume," the city government said, refusing elaborate. The abrupt disruption of air traffic prompted speculation that military exercises were being conducted in the area, since the Pudong International Airport is on the city's waterfront. The military exercises broad authority over China's airspace, and flights along the southeastern coast are occasionally diverted, delayed or cancelled due to military movements in the region, which faces Taiwan. But such activities have rarely caused the outright closure of a major airport like Pudong, which serves China's biggest city. Flights to and from Pudong, to the east of the city, stopped at about 1400, local time, said a city government spokesman, who spoke on customary condition of anonymity. Nearly five hours later, staff at some airline counters said some flights were beginning to board. But they said there could be more disruptions over the weekend.

I-EVER

London, Dec 6 — Robinson R-44 helicopter, I-EVER, was destroyed when it crashed in a lagoon near Venice, Italy, at 1715, UTC, Nov 26. One of the helicopter's occupants was fatally injured, while the other

occupant was seriously injured. The local flight departed from Crevan Island.

N665CD

London, Dec 1 — A press report, dated Nov 30, states: A small plane crashed this evening near Charlotte Douglas International Airport, killing the pilot, authorities said. The pilot, whose name has not been released, was the only person aboard the Cirrus SR22, according to the Mecklenburg Emergency Medical Services Agency. The single-engine, four-seat plane was on its way to Charlotte after taking off from Dekalb-Peachtree Airport in Atlanta, said Kathleen Bergen, a spokeswoman for the Federal Aviation Administration. The plane crashed about seven miles north of the Charlotte airport around 1945 hrs, she said. The plane was registered to Auala, LCC in Atlanta according to the FAA. Other listed owners were Satsysenger, LCC; McKinney Phillip; Thompson Roy Alan; Wright Allen; and Vrana George.

London, Dec 4 — Cirrus SR22 N665CD crashed near Charlotte, North Carolina, at 0044, Dec 1, while on a flight from Atlanta, Georgia, to Charlotte. The aircraft was destroyed. The one person on board was killed.

N9797Q

London, Dec 4 — A_press_report, dated today, states: The pilot of a twin-engine aircraft was killed when it crashed near the Mount Snow airport sometime over the weekend (Dec 2-3), according to police. Wilmington Police Chief Joseph Szarejko said the pilot would not be identified until his family had been notified. There was no one else in the aircraft, which was reported was a private aircraft. According to a police report, the aircraft was found in a heavily wooded area south of the runway of Mount Snow Airport around 0900, on Sunday. Szarejko said rescue personnel began searching for the aircraft around 1800 on Saturday because it was overdue. The aircraft left West Chester, N.Y., around noon and was scheduled to arrive at Mount Snow around 1400 according to police. Police did not release any information about what time the aircraft may have crashed. The Dover Police Department, Vermont State Police Search and Rescue, the Civil Air Patrol, the Vermont Army National Guard, Deerfield Valley Rescue, New England K-9 and fire departments from Wilmington and West Dover took part in the search. The Federal Aviation Agency will investigate the cause of the crash. According to the National Weather Service, there was no precipitation on Saturday afternoon and the cloud ceiling was not particularly low. However, winds were gusting at up to 30 mph and may have been even stronger at higher elevations.

London, Dec 4 — Aerostar 601P N9797Q crashed near West Dover, Vermont, at 1745, Dec 2. The aircraft was destroyed. The one person on board was killed.

Two male passengers were found dead in the aircraft at the crash site. The Ramsey County Medical Examiner will perform an autopsy on both men. Authorities in Crookston say the men were University of North Dakota students. The sheriff's department says the FAA will investigate the crash.

London, Dec 4 — Cessna 172L (Skyhawk) N9850G crashed near Crookston, Minnesota, at 0123, Dec 2, while on a local flight from Crookston. The aircraft sustained substantial damage. The two persons on board were killed.



SUZUKI MOTOR VEHICLES, JAPAN

London, Dec 6 — Suzuki Motor Corp said yesterday it would recall nearly 120,000 cars across five models because of faulty airbag systems. The minivehicle maker reported the plan to recall 119,718 units of Swift, Wagon R, Solio, Cruise and MW models produced between March 2003 and September this year, to the ministry of land, infrastructure and transport.



PANAMA CANAL

Balboa, Dec 7 — Present backlog stands at 60 ships and the Canal is showing projected backlog in the next 24 hours at 57 ships.
